# Introduction

The Northern Mallee Declared Species Group Inc. (NMDSG) formed in 2004, following a community meeting called by concerned farmers, due to the increased livestock attacks by wild dogs within the Esperance Region. Cuts to the State Wild Dog Eradication Program in 2000 saw an escalation in wild dog numbers, with 3,000 sheep being lost within the Esperance Region during 2003 alone.

The Honourable Mark Lewis MLC Minister for Agriculture and Food gave consent to recognition for Northern Mallee Declared Species Group Inc. to become a Recognised Biosecurity Group for the purposes of section 169 of the Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Act 2007, on the 23<sup>rd</sup> February 2017.

In May 2017 the Northern Mallee Declared Species Group Inc. official changed the group's name to Esperance Biosecurity Association Inc. to show better representation for all landholders within the group's operational area.

The EBA is managed by an active and dedicated voluntary committee comprising of 11 farmers, who employ two Licensed Pest Management Technicians (LPMTs) and an Administrator. The EBA Committee meet regularly to ensure efficient management of the group.

EBA work closely with Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, Esperance Shire Council and Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions, consulting with them regularly and inviting them to attend committee meetings to assist with the management of the group.

The EBA has gained significant experience managing wild dog populations using alternative methods currently employed throughout the region. It is the responsibility of landholders to control wild dogs on their property, however, EBA were specifically set up to assist with controlling wild dogs within the region. The group's LPMTs target their efforts at the interface of agricultural land and the vast areas of woodlands, which provide the source of new wild dogs entering the agricultural land.

The EBA was the community driver of the proposal to construct an extension to the State Barrier Fence, to extend around the Esperance Agricultural area. Funding for this extension was announced in May 2019 with work beginning in June, 2020. Progress of the Extension is currently stalled.

# Aims and objectives

The primary focus or goal of the EBA is to improve the co-ordination of wild dog management and control within the Shire of Esperance to reduce livestock losses.

# Strategies to achieve this goal

- To implement and maintain best practice wild dog management on private and public lands in the region
- Enable a whole community response to the wild dog predation issues in the region and incorporate a biodiversity component in the management actions to reduce the impact of wild dogs upon natural resources as well as livestock.

- Increase community participation in wild dog and fox management.
- To monitor, evaluate and report on the progress towards reducing wild dog damage to livestock in the Esperance region.
- To provide proactive and positive extension activity driven by the community group that will facilitate broader community awareness of wild dog issues locally and nationally.

#### **Activities and Achievements**

# **EBA** activities

The EBA currently employs one Licensed Pest Management Technician. The LPMT is fully licensed and hold current insurance policies to cover Business Insurance (up to \$10,000,000 liability), operating as private contractors to EBA

Through the employment of Licensed Pest Management Technicians EBA has been able to maintain a protection buffer zone along the 700km boundary between Agricultural and Un-allocated Crown Land, protecting livestock and remnant native systems from the attacks of wild dogs.

The protection buffer zone and hot spots are managed using an integrated tracking, trapping and baiting program complying with best pest management control practice. This program is solely delivered by the

trained Licensed Pest Management Technicians, complying with the *Code of Practice for the Safe Use* and *Management of Strychnine in Western Australia* and the *Code of Practice for the Safe Use and Management of 1080 in Western Australia*. This integrated program runs all year round, as a proactive approach to addressing the wild dog issue and regularly monitoring wild dog hotspots within the area.

The wild dog baiting program also effectively controls foxes, which provides positive environmental outcomes for small to mid-sized native animals.

#### **EBA Achievements**

EBA has successfully reduced the number of wild dogs within the Esperance Region and greatly reduced the attacks upon livestock. The below table shows the total number of wild dogs destroyed and baits laid by the group. The number of wild dogs taken is likely an under-estimate, noting that many wild dogs that take a bait will die elsewhere and not be detected.

# UCL - department of parks and wildlife

The majority of the Group's activities are carried out within Un-allocated Crown Land, managed by the Department of Parks and Wildlife (DBCA), which surrounds the Esperance Agricultural Area. Current risk assessments for all these areas have been completed, in consultation with Darren Dixon - DAFWA and Stephen Butler - DBCA. With all parties holding copies of the permits (DAFWA, DBCA and EBA) these permits/risk assessments are current from 1<sup>st</sup> August 2015 until 31<sup>st</sup> July 2020.

# Esperance Agricultural Landholders

For all activities carried out on privately owned land, each individual landholder is responsible for obtaining a current risk assessment for their property prior to the Licensed Pest Management Technician undergoing any strychnine or 1080 applications.

EBA works closely with Landholders offering support and training on best pest management techniques for the control of declared pests (wild dogs and foxes) on their properties.

# Monitoring and reporting

# Monitoring of groups activities

The EBA's dedicated voluntary committee hold regular meetings to monitor on-ground and administration activities. An AGM is held in September/October of each year followed by committee meetings as needed throughout the year. The EBA Committee consists of Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary/Treasurer, and 8 additional supporting members. The EBA Committee is elected each year at the AGM. DPIRD, DBCA and the Esperance Shire Council work closely with the EBA Committee. Newsletters and notices are distributed to the EBA members keeping them informed.

# Monitoring of Licensed pest management technicians

The EBA Committee outline the tasks required of the Licensed Pest Management Technicians, who work as Independent Contractors to EBA. EBA work with consultation with DPIRD and DBCA for areas of baiting and protocols.

Licensed Pest Management Technicians report regularly on activities to the EBA Committee, all activities are logged and recorded using GPS Data Loggers. Each Data Logger is presented to DPIRD monthly, the data downloaded and recorded on DPIRD's Wild Dog Management database and FeralScan. This data is prepared into detailed maps showing each location a wild dog is caught and baits laid, these maps are presented to the EBA Committee, other DPIRD officers and DBCA.

# Monitoring of administration

An Administrator is employed by the group to handle administration duties. The Administrator reports to Committee Meetings and works closely with the Chairman and Secretary/Treasurer.

# Reporting to funding bodies

The group reports regularly to funding bodies, keeping in line with the individual funding agreements.

# Monitoring and reporting of off target deaths

The monitoring and reporting of off target deaths is to be carried out for the duration of this plan, with Licensed Pest Management Technicians, Committee and community members reporting any observations or reports to the EBA. This is to be included as an agenda item for committee meetings and reports documented in the minutes. DPIRD and DBCA are to be immediately notified of reported non-target deaths. Investigation to be carried out in consultation with DPIRD and/or DBCA for any reported non-target deaths.

Off target incidents report to be submitted annually to the Pesticides Advisory Committee.

#### Reporting process for landholder on wild dog attacks

Landholders within the Esperance Region are encouraged to inform EBA Committee members or Administrator of wild dog attacks and number of stock losses due to wild dogs on their properties. This information greatly assists with assessing the effectiveness of the control program being implemented.

These reports can assist the Licensed Pest Management Technicians in targeting wild dog hotspots and preventing these dogs from causing further attacks.

# Operation / funding

# Membership

Membership and Corporate Membership fees raised cover meeting expenses for the group, venue hire, catering and other associated costs. Surplus funds raised through membership go towards on-ground work expenses. EBA has a membership base of 73 Esperance Landholders and 10 Corporate Members.

# Pest Rate Funding

As a Recognised Biosecurity Group (RBG) the EBA receives this funding annually from which the groups work is paid from. This funding is managed on our behalf by the Shire of Esperance.

# issues that may affect this management plan

# State barrier fence extension

The Esperance Extension of the State Barrier Fence was announced May 2019 and to June 2021, 63 km of the 660km has been completed. Fencing can re-commence upon the completion of the ILUA negotiations with Esperance Tjaltjraak Native Title Aboriginal Corporation and Ngula People.

Upon completion of the Fence, the work required for Wild Dog control will be greatly reduced, however a LPMT will still be required to control dogs along the fence and in the wildlife corridors that will remain open, such as Lort River, Young River and Oldfield River corridors.
